





A FESTIVAL OF NINE LESSONS AND CAROLS

This beloved service can be traced to Truro, England where, on Christmas Eve of 1880, Bishop E.W. Benson put together the "little service for Christmas Eve—nine carols and nine tiny lessons, which were read by various officers of the Church." King's College in Cambridge, England adapted this service and has held it continuously each Christmas Eve since 1918

Wherever the service is heard and however it is adapted, whether the music is provided by choir or congregation, the pattern and strength of the service, as Dean Milner-White points out, derive from the scriptures. "The main theme is the development of the loving purposes of God ... 'seen' through the windows and words of the Bible."

It is our earnest prayer that this evening's service will inspire a joyous celebration of Advent as we prepare our hearts and minds to commemorate Christ's first coming and as we are reminded of God's people who long ago awaited the Messiah's arrival.

If you have never considered the true meaning of Christmas, the claims of Jesus Christ, and what it means to come to Jesus for forgiveness of sins and eternal life, I would love to talk with you.
